Momentum Building as I-69 Construction Continues

Advancing Projects

- The sustained effort to ramp up planning, funding and construction of priority projects on the 1,142-mile I-69 System in Texas has gained significant momentum in the past five years.
- TxDOT is pushing forward to advance priority projects, filling in gaps that will allow more already completed segments to be added to the Interstate Highway System.
- Interstate 69 is being developed as a series of incremental upgrades to existing highways - US 59, US 77, US 281, SH 44, US 83 and US 84. A total of 207 miles of I-69 and I-2 have been added to the Interstate System. About half of the overall mileage on the Texas I-69 System is either now signed as interstate or is in some stage of the TxDOT project development process.

\$3.4 Billion in 2019 UTP for I-69

More than 45 projects on the I-69 System with a combined construction cost of more than \$3.4 billion are included in TxDOT's 2019 Unified Transportation Program (UTP). The UTP authorizes TxDOT and partners to move forward with studies, design, ROW acquisition, final engineering and construction. The I-69 Advisory Committee is assisting TxDOT in identifying and prioritizing projects for future funding. Steady progress can only be made with sustained state funding.

A Multimodal Freight Corridor


- The Texas highways that make up I-69 are already major freight corridors connecting Gulf Coast manufactures, inland markets, Texas seaports and border ports. Freight traffic on Texas highways is projected to double by 2040 and completing I-69 is essential to ensuring safety and efficient movement of goods.
- More than one-third of the population of Texas lives in the counties along the I-69 System route. These Texans depend on I-69 and future I-69 highway upgrades for local mobility and as vital inter-regional connectors. And continued improvement of the I-69 system is important to providing additional evacuation capacity for the growing population along the Texas Coast.

Protecting Props 1 & 7 Funding

- Progress on I-69 has been possible because Texas voters overwhelmingly approved Proposition 1 and Proposition 7 funding. The Alliance for I-69 Texas urges the Legislature to fully appropriate highway funding promised to voters.
- We further urge lawmakers to eliminate the 2025 sunset termination date for Prop 1 funding or, at a minimum, to extend the Prop 1 termination date for 10 years. This is essential to TxDOT's ability to plan and award contracts for highway projects which stretch over several years.


